Thank you for your recent emails about Senate Bill 8 (SB8) concerning the NC Constitutional Amendment defending traditional marriage as between one man and one woman.

First of all, I do not hate homosexuals. I love them more. For as a physician, I am frequently saddened by the suffering from the illnesses of my homosexual patients that are directly related to this unhealthy lifestyle. Did you know that the average life span of a homosexual is only 55 years, as opposed to 78 yrs. for a heterosexual? Most often this is because there is no known cure for some of the related illnesses and disease from this aberrant form of coupling.
