### Religious Freedom Bills

Other bills have merit, but Georgians need the most broad-based religious protections this year, thus the heavy focus is on RFRA and FADA.

Regarding RFRA, Gov. Deal’s message has been somewhat consistent – he will sign a bill if it gets to his desk. He has also consistently said that he wants a RFRA bill that mirrors the federal 1993 RFRA, yet he has also said he thought some anti-discrimination should be included. He vacillates on this point.

As recently as September 2, 2015, Gov. Deal said, “As long as we follow the federal model, which has not produced the kinds of catastrophic results that maybe both sides are predicting that legislation of that type would do, I think we stand a very good chance of getting a piece of legislation accomplished that will rightfully protect people from government in terms of their religious beliefs and at the same time not be disruptive to commerce.”

HB 218 Support	Religious Freedom Restoration Act (RFRA) This bill is faithful to the federal RFRA, but does have a couple of state-specific provisions added.	Rep. Sam Teasley (R-Marietta)	<b>Final status: bill never received a hearing.</b>
HB 756 Support	This legislation is designed to protect certain business entities from any requirement to provide goods or services for a wedding ceremony. HB 870 (similar to SB 309) Support	This bill prohibits public schools from becoming members of athletic associations that block interschool play with non-member schools, such as faith-based schools. SB 309 (similar to HB 870) Support	This bill prohibits public schools from becoming members of athletic associations that block interschool play with non-member schools, such as faith-based schools. It also protects student athletes' religious expression, including on their clothing.	Sen. Burt Jones (R-Jackson)	<b>Passed House and Senate and awaits governor's signature.</b>
